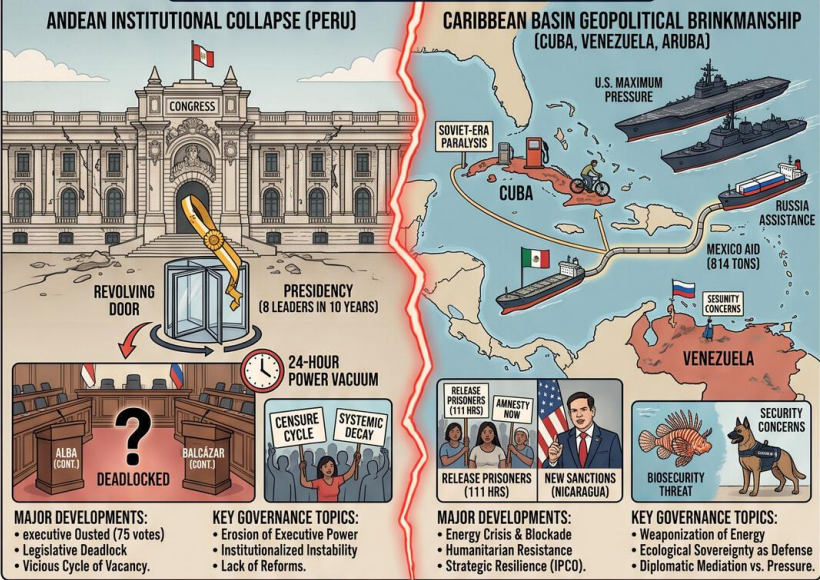

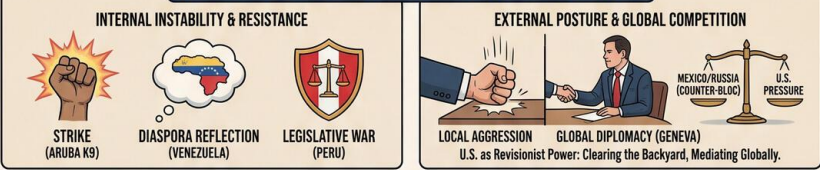

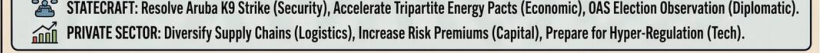

CONVERGENCE OF INSTITUTIONAL COLLAPSE IN THE ANDES AND GEOPOLITICAL BRINKMANSHIP IN THE CARIBBEAN BASIN

DAY-AT-A-GLANCE

February 19, 2026, marks a period of profound institutional volatility across Latin America, punctuated by the **collapse of the Peruvian executive** and an escalating humanitarian crisis in the Caribbean. The removal of interim President José Jerí by the Peruvian Congress—the seventh leader to fall in a decade—has created a dangerous power vacuum in Lima, leaving the state in a [24-hour leadership void](#) as factions struggle to elect a successor amidst accusations of corruption and sexual misconduct. This systemic instability in the Andes is mirrored by the **intensification of U.S. "maximum pressure" tactics** in the Caribbean, where Cuba faces Soviet-era levels of economic paralysis due to [fuel blockades](#), forcing a reliance on humanitarian aid from Mexico and Russia.

Simultaneously, the broadcast highlights a surge in **civil society-led resistance** against authoritarian regimes. In Venezuela, the

"mothers' hunger strike" for the release of political prisoners has become a focal point for domestic unrest, as the U.S. government reportedly pressures the Maduro administration to fulfill [prisoner release promises](#). MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS

Institutional Collapse of the Peruvian Presidency

- The Peruvian Congress approved a motion of [censure against José Jerí](#) with 75 votes in favor, removing him after just 130 days in office.
- Legislators are deadlocked between **María del Carmen Alba** (Acción Popular) and **José María Balcázar** (Perú Libre) in a [second round of voting](#) to determine a transitional leader until the April 12 elections.
- The political crisis is described as a "vicious cycle" where the legislature [repeatedly vacates presidents](#) to protect its own power, preventing necessary constitutional reforms.

Energy and Humanitarian Crisis in Cuba

- U.S. administration policies blocking oil shipments have left Cuba [increasingly paralyzed](#), with residents comparing the current situation to the "Special Period" following the Soviet collapse.
- Mexico has intervened with [814 tons of aid](#), including food and medicine, while Russia provides "adequate assistance" to counteract the naval blockade.
- Internal transport has shifted largely to bicycles as [fuel remains unavailable](#) at pumps across the island.

Escalating Human Rights Pressure on Venezuela and Nicaragua

- Mothers of Venezuelan political prisoners have maintained a [hunger strike for 111 hours](#), demanding the release of detainees including Joel Bravo and Eric Díaz.
- U.S. Senator Marco Rubio announced new [sanctions on Nicaragua's prison director](#), Roberto Clemente Guevara Gómez, for "grave violations of human rights."
- The U.S. State Department is reportedly linking the [lifting of sanctions](#) to the verifiable release of all political prisoners in Venezuela.

KEY GOVERNANCE TOPICS

Leadership Dynamics & Governance

- Peru's "revolving door" presidency reflects **systemic institutional decay**, with the nation facing its eighth president in ten years following [the ouster of Jerí](#).
- The Aruba-Netherlands IPCO delegation emphasizes a [tripartite cooperation model](#) to manage regional security and economic diversification away from tourism reliance.

Diplomacy & Statecraft

- U.S.-mediated peace talks between Russia and Ukraine in Geneva concluded after only two hours with ["difficult" negotiations](#) and unresolved territorial disputes.

DEEP DIVE: TRENDS AND THEMES

The Weaponization of Energy and Scarcity

This represents a shift toward **holistic security**, where biological threats are treated with the same urgency as traditional military or economic risks.

INTERNAL DYNAMICS & DOMESTIC INSTABILITY

Aruba: Labor and Governance Tension

- The **Duana (Customs) K9 unit strike** signals a rift between frontline security personnel and the Ministry of Finance. Despite ministerial claims of dialogue, [personnel express ongoing neglect](#) regarding security protocols, suggesting a potential breakdown in trust within critical state institutions.

Venezuela: Diaspora Reflection and Domestic Desperation

- A significant narrative shift is occurring within the Venezuelan diaspora, with [intense reflections on "returning"](#) following the capture of high-profile regime figures like Nicolás Maduro and Cilia Flores. However, this is countered by the **extreme domestic desperation** evidenced by hunger strikes, indicating that while the leadership may be crumbling, the humanitarian [suffering remains acute](#).

Peru: Legislative-Executive War

- The Peruvian Congress is portrayed as a **hostile actor** toward the executive, using censure motions as a weapon to prevent accountability. The [lack of consensus](#) for a new president, even with only four candidates, highlights a total failure of political elite mediation.

EXTERNAL DYNAMICS & GLOBAL POSTURE

The U.S. as a Revisionist Power

- **Roberto Clemente Guevara Gómez (Nicaragua): Loser.** Sanctioned by the U.S. for [human rights violations](#) in the Nicaraguan prison system.

EDITORIAL POSTURE & STORY HIERARCHY

TeleAruba maintains a **bifurcated editorial stance**. Local coverage is **reassuring and professional**, focusing on education, carnival, and inter-parliamentary cooperation (IPCO). - **Customs K9 Unit (Aruba):** Framed as a **necessary but disruptive actor**. Their strike is seen as a [legitimate response to security failures](#), yet a threat to the smooth operation of the island's borders.
- **Meta (Mark Zuckerberg):** Portrayed as **evasive and defensive** during California court hearings regarding [social media addiction](#) and juvenile mental health.

INFORMATION WARFARE ENVIRONMENT

- **Narrative Seeding:** The Dutch feed prominently features the [Natalie van Berkele CV scandal](#), potentially used as a "controlled leak" to purge the new cabinet of unreliable members early in its term.

- **Psychological Operations:** The U.S. framing of the Cuban fuel shortage as a ["humanitarian disaster on the horizon"](#) is a classic narrative technique to justify eventual more direct intervention or regime change under the guise of aid.
- **Censorship vs. Transparency:** In Peru, the [prohibition of cameras](#) in certain courtrooms and legislative sessions is noted as a barrier to public trust, forcing journalists to rely on manual "apuntes" (notes).

HYPOTHESES AND FUTURE OUTLOOK

- **The Peru Censure Chain-Reaction:** If Congress fails to elect a neutral interim president like Alba, Peru will likely see [mass social unrest](#) before the April elections, as the public's "astargo" (exhaustion) with the political elite reaches a breaking point.
- **Cuban State Failure:** The total paralysis of the transport sector in Cuba [will lead to an exodus](#) of refugees toward Mexico and Florida within weeks unless the blockade is eased or Mexican aid increases exponentially.
