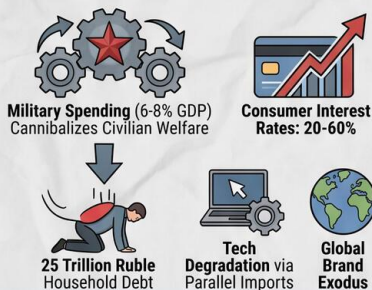

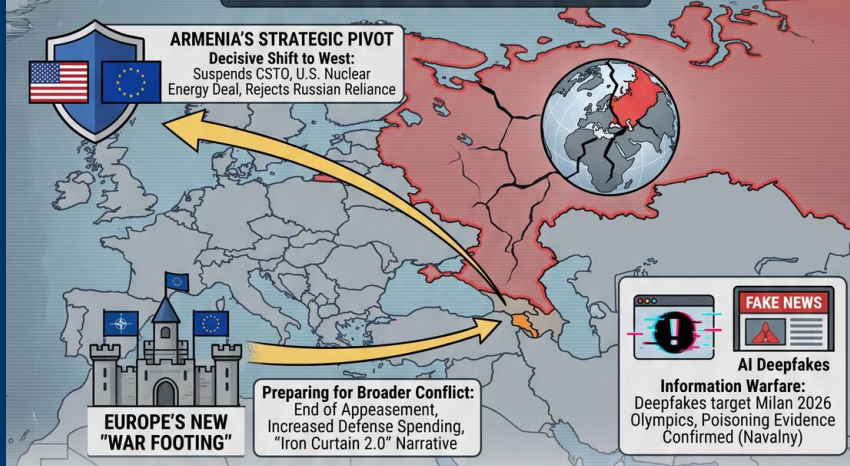

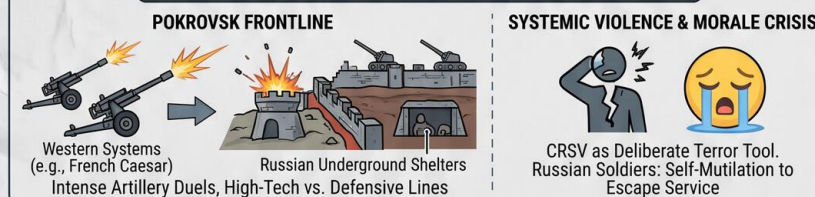

DAY-AT-A-GLANCE

The broadcast day of February 22, 2026, depicts a Russia fully submerged in a "mobilization economy," where military production consumes 6-8% of GDP, effectively cannibalizing civilian welfare to sustain a protracted conflict in Ukraine.
